Functions of the Integumentary system 1 protection a) chemical factors in the skin: Sebum (or oil) from the sebaceous glands is slightly acidic, retarding bacterial colonization on the skin surface Sweat from the sudoriferous glands is slightly hypertonic and can flush off most bacteria on the

skin surface

Chapter 5 The Integumentary System: 5 Jaundice: yellow w/liver damage - bile in bld Jaundice: Yellow skin discoloration caused by hyperbilirubinemia Anatomy of the liver An obstruction in the bile duct may lead to jaundice 6 Birthmark: congenital disorder of dermal BV Capillary Malformation ("Port-wine Stain") Vascular birthmarks are caused by enlarged small blood vessels just beneath
